HIGHLIGHTS FROM A YEAR OF CONNECTION

Thanks to your support, we served 1,910 children and family members, and nurtured 28 community partnerships, through initiatives that included:

- The 2nd annual Children's Ancestral Homeland Trip, which brought 8 youth and 3 leaders from the Mohican Community in Wisconsin to Flying Deer for a week of nature immersion and cultural engagement
- A day for teens from Hong Kong and Berkshire County focused on wild edibles as a vital component of food security
- Our 5th year of Treecess in-school programming at Ichabod Crane schools, serving 580 students and 35 teachers biweekly
- * Trainings and workshops for teachers, parents, and students, to support the launch of Morningside Playcare's daily outdoor forest programming in Manhattan for 5- and 6-year-olds



Flying Deer was chosen for a cross-cultural anthropology study that explores how children in diverse cultures form relationships with the natural world. Researcher Amey Zhang of Learning Natures selected us for our intentional culture-building, commitment to childhood and young adult development, and longstanding community.

We welcomed three Indigenous educators (including Kristine Hill, at right) who shared teachings throughout the year, connecting our seasonal celebrations to Indigenous practices and infusing programs with a deeper understanding of the stories of Mohican and Haudenasuanee people.


